DETAILED ITINERARY

Day 1 : Cairo

Saturday. Welcome to Egypt and the start of your holiday! Arrival at Cairo Airport, you will be met by a representative from On The Go Tours. The prominent sign depicting our company logo easily identifies our representative. Cairo International Airport can appear to be a little chaotic to the uninitiated. This is normal! Upon exiting the airport you will be escorted to our awaiting transportation and transferred to your hotel. Here, your Egyptian adventure begins!

For those arriving a day or two earlier than Day One of the tour, one of our team will be on hand to advise on where best to enjoy your extra time in Cairo in advance of the tour commencing. Day One is designed to be an arrival day for all passengers, so there are no formal arrangements on this first day. **Overnight - Cairo**

Day 2 : Pyramids & Saqqara



Cairo – Aswan. After a good nights rest, we have a full day of touring planned for today. You'll need to have your bags packed as we'll be travelling down to Aswan in southern Egypt tonight. Throughout the tour, you'll be fully briefed by your tour leader as regards touring arrangements. This morning your entrance fees and tipping kitty will be collected from everyone. The tip kitty will cover all the tipping throughout the tour, except tips for the felucca captain and your tour guide. The pyramids epitomize ancient Egypt, yet the biggest were constructed during a short span of time, early on in a civilization that was to last almost three millennia. Taking a guided tour this morning we witness the

finest achievement of the pyramid builders - the Great Pyramids of Giza. Built near the capital city of Memphis for the fourth dynasty kings Cheops, Chephren and Mycerinus who ruled through 2589 - 2504BC.

Continuing we drive to necropolis at Saqqara we visit the largest pyramid in all of Egypt, the Step Pyramid at Saqqara. Built during the third dynasty of the Old Kingdom (prior to the Pyramids of Giza) to protect the body of the king Zoser who died around 2649BC. The Step Pyramid was the blue print or the feat that heralded the short but remarkable age of the gigantic stone pyramids of ancient Egypt.

Later there is time for dinner before travelling on the overnight seater train to Aswan. At the train station, there'll be the opportunity to buy more water and snacks for the trip ahead. Option to upgrade to sleeper train cabins. See brochure or website for details. **Overnight - Train (B)**

Day 3 : Philae Temple & Aswan High Dam

Aswan. Arrive and check into our hotel. A visit out of town takes us to the mighty High Dam – a modern feat of engineering, the by-product for which is Lake Nasser – the world's largest artificial lake! Continuing, we enjoy a short boat trip to Agilika Island for Philae Temple - dedicated to the goddess Isis. The temple dates from 4th century BC but the Ptolomies and the Romans up to 3rd century AD built most of the existing structures. Later, free time to perhaps do some shopping in the colourful souks and markets or simply relax in this attractive town which straddles the River Nile. **Overnight - Aswan (B)**

Days 4-5 : Felucca Sailing



Aswan – Nile felucca cruise – Kom Ombo - all meals. Day 4 - Optional early morning air excursion to famous Abu Simbel - the gargantuan rockcut temple of King Ramses II, the Great Builder (details of this optional excursion are featured in our brochure and online). Possibly the most awe-inspiring temple of all ancient Egypt, with its gargantuan rock-cut façade, Abu Simbel was created to revere the mighty pharaonic ruler King Ramses II. Guarding the entrance to the temple, the four famous colossal statues of Ramses II sit majestically, staring out across the desert, seemingly since time began. Famously, the temple was re-located in a multi-million dollar operation in 1972, further up from the shoreline of Lake Nasser,

which had threatened to erode the foundations of this monolithic temple complex.

If you choose not to embark upon this optional excursion, there is plenty to do in Aswan, before our early afternoon departure on our Nile felucca cruise. You can relax at the hotel, explore Aswan and its beautiful shoreline and corniche or perhaps do a spot of shopping. This afternoon, we board our wind-powered Nile felucca for a 2-night voyage on the River Nile upstream to Kom Ombo. Feluccas are simple sailboats based on a unique design and have plied the mighty Nile since ancient times.

If sailing by felucca is not for you, consider upgrading to a 5 star Luxury Nile Cruise with our Pharaoh's Pass. 2 nights onboard the felucca. All meals included.

NOTE: As feluccas are wind-powered, our itinerary cannot be rigidly defined. However, during our cruise, we make plenty of stops to visit points of interest, areas for swimming and for the purpose of performing our ablutions. (there are no toilets or showers on board) The felucca sails during the day, and prior to sundown, the anchor is dropped and we moor at the riverside for the night. The craft carries between 5-10 passengers comfortably and the deck is strewn with soft colorful cushions and rugs and equipped with a canopy that offers shade and protection from the elements. You will need to bring a sleeping bag/ sleeping sheet and also a towel with you. Soft drinks, water and beer can be purchased aboard.

THE NILE FELUCCA CRUISE: Before boarding the felucca, it is important you prepare a day bag - taking care to pack things you feel you'll need during the cruise, as your large bag will be placed below in below deck storage. If unable to swim, you must advise your tour leader before boarding.

5 STAR NILE CRUISER: Those travellers who have opted and paid the supplement to travel aboard the Nile 5 Star cruiser will be provided with their cruising schedule upon arrival in Cairo. Boarding of the Nile 5 star cruiser will usually be on Day 3 for a period of 3 nights, or on Day 4 for a period of 3 nights. **Overnight - Felucca Cruise (B:2, L:2, D:2)**

Day 6 : Kom Ombo & Edfu Temple

Kom Ombo - Edfu - Luxor. Disembarking in Kom Ombo, we enjoy a visit to the Temple of Horus at Edfu. Having the distinction of being the largest and most completely preserved pharaonic, albeit Greek-built, temple in Egypt, it was one of the last monumental temples built on a large scale. Though much newer than the temples of Karnak and Luxor, its excellent state of structural preservation fills in a lot of historical gaps because it is, in effect, a 2000 year old replica of an architectural style that was already age-old during Ptolemaic times. Back on the bus, we rejoin the police convoy as we drive north to Luxor. Home of the legendary Valley of the Kings and Temple of Karnak, 4000 year-old Luxor is ancient Egypt at it's best. Enjoy some rest and relaxation. Tonight, an optional visit is available

to the Temple of Luxor. The excursion is payable locally. Rest of evening free. **Overnight - Luxor (B)**

Day 7 : Valley of the Kings



Luxor - Cairo. An early start allows us to avoid some of the fierce heat as we venture to the awesome Valley of the Kings. The first monument you'll see on the West Bank is the imposing 18m-high Colossi of Memnon, which represent the remains of the temple of the hedonistic Amenophis III. Further highlights include the legendary Valley of the Kings and the Temple of Queen Hatshepsut. This morning there is also the chance to opt for a hot air balloon flight - see the website or brochure for more details.

The Valley of the Kings is studded with often highly decorated tombs, constructed to once house the regal sarcophagi enclosed mummies of the mighty pharaohs awaiting their passage into the after-life. Later this afternoon after time to relax, we visit the Temple of Karnak - a spectacular temple on a gigantic scale dedicated to the Theban gods. Karnak is a spectacular complex of sanctuaries, pylons, chapels, halls and obelisks, all dedicated to the Theban gods and to the greater glory of Egypt's Middle and New Kingdom rulers.

There's time for R&R by the hotel swimming pool this afternoon, before returning to Cairo by overnight seater train. Sleeper cabin upgrade available. **Overnight - Train (B)**

Day 8 : Cairo & The Egyptian Museum

Arriving to Cairo, we set off on a guided tour of the Museum of Egyptian Antiquities, commonly referred to as the Egyptian Museum. The museum is home to an extensive collection of some 120 000 ancient Egyptian antiquities, with a representative amount on display, the remainder in storerooms. Opt to visit the Royal Mummy Room, where 9 royal mummies from the New Kingdom is displayed.

The discovery, by eminent archaeologist Howard Carter of King Tutankhamen's treasure-filled tomb at the Valley of the Kings in 1922 is one of the archaeological world's greatest finds. The Egyptian Museum offers an exhibition dedicated to the showcasing of the treasures found in the boy King's tomb, along with the prize exhibit which has to be the priceless funerary treasures of King Tutankhamen, including his legendary solid gold death mask. This afternoon we offer an optional

Day 9 : Dahab - by the Red Sea



Cairo - Dahab. Today we cross the Suez Canal and travel onto Dahab, located on the Red Sea. Journey time approx 7 hours. Arrive Dahab and check in. Dahab's waterfront is dotted with relaxed cafes, bars and shops to dine, drink and shop the day away. Heading down to the beach in front of our hotel this afternoon you can grab a snorkel and some fins and discover the deep blue! Most of the aquatic species live within the first 5 metres beneath the sea level. **Overnight - Dahab (B)**

Day 10 : Cross the Gulf of Aqaba to Jordan



Dahab - Petra (Jordan). Today we transfer to Nuweiba Port to cross the Gulf of Aqaba by ferry and travel onward to Petra. This evening we will meet our Jordanian tour guide and other tour members continuing with us through Jordan. Tonight, it may be possible to take a candlelit walk through the Siq by attending the 'Petra by Night' excursion.

Overnight - Petra (B)

Day 11 : The Rose Red City of Petra



Petra. Taking a walk through the mysterious siq (an ancient passage created thanks to a geological fissure) we are confronted by the spectacle of the breath-taking rose-red facade of the Treasury. Actually serving as a royal tomb, the massive rock cut structure in known locally at the treasury according to legend that pirates hid their treasure there.

Amazing Nabataean and Roman ruins are on tap here at Petra, including tombs, a Roman road, temples and amphitheatre. The energetic can ascend the many stone carved steps to Ad-Deir, better known as the Monastery. Consider opting for our Petra Kitchen bolt-on tonight to learn how to cook delicious Jordanian cuisine. **Overnight - Petra (B)**

Day 12 : Wadi Rum



Petra - Wadi Rum. This morning we can return to the Rose Red city for further exploration. Then drive to Wadi Rum for a 4x4 desert safari before enjoying a traditional Jordanian dinner and a night camping in the desert. **Overnight - Wadi Rum (B, D)**

Day 13 : The Dead Sea



Wadi Rum - Karak - Dead Sea - Madaba. This morning we explore the 12th century crusader castle of Karak(or Shobak Castle) before descending to the lowest point on the earth's surface - the Dead Sea. Here, we enjoy lunch and take a dip in the mineral-rich waters, which are famously buoyant, due to the high salinity. A short drive leads us to the ancient Christian-Muslim market town of Madaba - famed for its Byzantine mosaics. Here, if time permits you'll have time to explore before tonight's dinner in a delightful local restaurant. **Overnight - Madaba (B, L, D)**

Day 14 : Amman



Friday. Madaba - Amman Airport. Madaba is easily navigable on foot allowing you to further sightsee or shop for souvenirs and curios before taking our departure transfer to Amman airport.

Note: Madaba and Amman are equidistant from Queen Alia International Airport. We choose to stay in Madaba rather than Amman as the capital city is widely spread across 7 hills with no particular centralised city centre or CBD. Previous passenger feedback has also highlighted the preference for staying in Madaba. However should you specifically wish to visit Amman you are able to do so by purchasing post tour accommodation and our departure transfer would be offered after the conclusion of your stay. For more information on the options available to you please speak with a member of our reservations team at time of booking.(B)

Perseids Meteor Shower - 04 August 2012 departure

Why not combine this tour with the fantastic celestial light show of the Perseids Meteor Shower? This magical event has mystified and amazed viewers for almost 2000 years. The night sky is lit up by often over 60 meteors per hour, streaking across the darkness.

Witness the incredible Perseids Meteor Shower on our special Tutankhamen to the Treasury meteor departure starting 04 August 2012 includes two spellbinding nights of stargazing in the wonderful setting of the Jordanian desert.

If you choose this date your itinerary will be revised as follows:

Days 1 - 09 - as per standard itinerary



Day 10 - Cross to Jordan and onwards to Wadi Rum for a 4x4 ride over the dunes. At night enjoy the light show as meteors light up the sky! Dinner and overnight - Wadi Rum.

Day 11 - Enjoy a camel trek through the desert before another night of star gazing. All meals and overnight - Wadi Rum.

Day 12 & 13 - Tour the spectacular rose city of Petra. Overnight Wadi Musa (Petra). On day 13 enjoy a free day to further explore Petra of your own accord (lunch excluded day 13).

Day 14 - An early start (approx 5am) allows us to visit the Dead Sea for a dip in the mineral rich waters. Afterwards drive on to Madaba (with lunch at the Dead Sea or Madaba) for some final sightseeing and souvenir shopping. Onward transfer to Amman airport*.

* NOTE: Please do not book your flights on day 14 before 7pm. Additional accommodation is available if you require, please contact us for prices.

KNOW BEFORE YOU GO

Visas

Visas are required by all visitors to Egypt. Visa forms are available from us. The Embassy of Egypt advises all travellers to procure their visa prior to entry into Egypt. However it still remains possible for nationals of some countries to procure their tourist visa upon arrival at Cairo International Airport.

Please note that in the event of visa refusal at port of entry, on the go cannot be held responsible.

All RSA passport holders must procure their Egyptian visa prior to departure.

When filling in an Egyptian visa form, you will be asked to provide your address in Egypt. For the purposes of this form, please use the following address: 68 Merghany St, Abou Ghaly Building Heliopolis, Cairo. Telephone: +2 02 241821 65

If your holiday incorporates a stay in Jordan, followed by further arrangements in Egypt (ie you travel to Jordan and then return to Egypt) you will need to procure a Multiple Entry Egyptian Tourist Visa that is only available before travelling to Egypt.

Please note that visa requirements are subject to change. Visa procurement is solely the responsibility of the traveller and not of On The Go Tours.

If travelling with us from Egypt to Jordan via Aqaba Seaport (the Jordanian port of entry if arriving from Egypt) a Jordanian Tourist Visa is obtainable upon arrival, free of charge for UK, EU, AUS,

NZ, CAN and USA passport holders. For all other nationalities please check with your local Jordanian Embassy. On departure from Jordan, via land or sea, a 5JD departure tax of is applied to all visitors.

Etiquette

Despite the inevitable ups and downs of travelling abroad, you will generally be shown great hospitality in Egypt. In return, please demonstrate sensitivity and respect for the local customs. Egypt is a Muslim country; so care should be taken to dress respectfully in large cities and towns, for example, when at markets and in public places.

- Ladies should avoid wearing 'clingy, tight or suggestive' attire, and stick to cool, flowing, cottons in busy city areas and markets
- Take care to dress conservatively and ensure that limbs are covered and remove footwear prior to entering a mosque.
- Ex-military style clothing should not be worn
- Ask permission before taking photographs of people.
- Beach attire is fine on board felucca cruises, at beach resorts or touristic areas i.e. at the Pyramids.
- Particular respect should be shown to Muslim women.
- The standard form of greeting is a handshake. Men and women do not kiss at any time as a form of greeting.

Mosques, Religion & Ramadan

90% of the population are Muslim. Others are Coptic Christians or followers of other faiths. All mosques (with the exception of Sayyida Zeinab and Al-Hussein in Cairo) are open to non-Muslims but cannot be visited during prayer times. For Egypt's best mosques, go to Islamic Cairo. Dress conservatively. Ensure limbs are covered and shoes removed when entering any Mosque. Men must refrain from wearing shorts, as must women.

RAMADAN

Ramadan is a month of fasting observed by Muslims throughout the world and adherents of the Muslim faith fast during daylight hours and break their fast with lavish meals and lively celebrations in the evening. Ramadan culminates a month later in a 3 day celebration called Eid al - Fitr. Many shops (excluding those which cater mainly to tourists) and attractions close earlier during Ramadan. As such we will start our tour earlier during this period to make the best use of time, leisure time will be offered in the late afternoon. Note: Traffic is exceptionally heavy during Ramadan, especially toward the time of breaking the fast.. Forthcoming Ramadan dates are as follows, (approximate) - 21 July - 20 August 2012
09 July - 07 August 2013

Many shops (excluding those which cater mainly to tourists) and attractions close earlier during Ramadan, so our itinerary is slightly altered to ensure we visit all itinerary attractions. Non Muslims are not expected to fast over Ramadan, but it is considered impolite to eat food or drink on the street. Ramadan

Trouble Shooting

These things will most likely never happen, but it's good to be prepared if they ever do. Here are a few tips to keep your trip hassle-free. Egypt is no worse than anywhere else when it comes to crime. The biggest problem seems to be petty theft, including pick-pocketing and bag snatching. Minimise your chances of being robbed with these tips:

- Leave valuables in the hotel safe deposit or better still, at home
- Carry your passport on your person or a photocopy as ID
- Carry your bag close to your person rather than over your shoulder
- Travel in a group or pair, especially if you are female
- Don't catch cabs late at night on your own
- Never drink anything offered to you in the street, unless you opened it yourself

It's not like home

Travel to far - flung corners of the earth involves lifestyles and conditions that are sometimes very different from what you are used to back home. You must come prepared to cope with unusual situations, local inadequacies and unpredictable events as and when they occur. Foreign travel is definitely not suitable for people who expect or demand everything to go exactly as planned. With the greatest respect and in the interest of your ultimate enjoyment you must understand this. Things can and do change in foreign countries.

Climate

Temperatures in Egypt are generally high (25 - 30 degrees) and even hotter in the summer months from May to September, when the sun can be fierce and temperatures soar, so pack light comfortable clothing, sunscreen and a hat.

In Cairo and the Nile Delta region, winter (October to February) can be cooler - so take a jacket, long-sleeved tops and trousers for the cooler evenings. The south remains warm during this time but again, temperatures do drop in the evenings. Rainfall is negligible with the most falling along Egypt's Mediterranean coastline.

Health Requirements

It is recommended that you be vaccinated for Tetanus and Polio, if you haven't had a booster in the last ten years. Food and waterborne diseases are more common, so we recommend vaccinations for typhoid (valid 3 years) and Hepatitis A (validity varies). Vaccination requirements can change so please check with your local health care provider before travel.

Currency

Egyptian Pounds (EGP or LE). Pounds Sterling, US Dollars and Euros are easily exchanged. You can obtain Egyptian Pounds (LE) at any major bank or your hotel. Exchange rates are subject to fluctuations.

Holiday Money

All funds collected in Egypt for entrance fees or optional excursion that you may wish to undertake are payable in local currency (EGP).

Time

Egypt is two hours ahead of Greenwich Mean Time (GMT)

Essential Packing

- Sleeping bag for the felucca or for camping in the White Desert (if applicable to your tour).
- Lightweight cotton garments.
- Comfortable walking shoes for the Pyramids and Valley of the Kings Pack flip flops/thongs/jandals to wear aboard the Nile felucca or Nile Cruiser
- DEET based mosquito repellent & antihistamine cream
- 2 pin, European electrical adaptor.
- Two spare passport photos & a photocopy of your passport
- A small daypack for your day-to-day needs.
- Sunglasses, hat, sunscreen, swim costume and torch
- Neck pillow, sleeping bag and eye mask, if travelling on the overnight seater train.
- Sleep sheet or sleeping bag if travelling with us to Jordan and staying at our Wadi Rum camp.

If doing a felucca cruise, undertaking the Mt Sinai excursion in Dahab or travelling between November and March, pack warm clothes (i.e. – fleece, jacket, trousers, jeans, hat and scarf) as temperatures plummet at night. Due to sometimes icy conditions at the summit of Mt Sinai, hiking boots and thermal clothing are a sensible consideration if undertaking the optional climb in winter (November - March).

Arrival Transfers

A complimentary airport arrival transfer is included in your tour. Upon arrival at Cairo Airport you will be met by a representative from On The Go Tours either just before immigration or in the baggage hall near the luggage belt of your respective arriving flight. The prominent sign depicting our company logo easily identifies our representative. Please have your tour voucher handy and make it available to our representative. After collecting your luggage you will be escorted to our awaiting transportation.

If, for any reason you have trouble locating our representative (after waiting 20 minutes in the arrival hall) or your flight to Egypt is delayed, please call or send a text message to the emergency contact number as stated on your tour voucher.

Travelling by overnight train

SEATER TRAIN: On many of our group tours journeying south from Cairo to Aswan and/or Luxor,

we utilise the overnight SEATER train service. This style of train offer basic and a modest level of comfort. Seating is reserved in air-conditioned Nefertiti Class or 1st Class Reserved seater wagons. Nefertiti style seats are located within 6 person, semi enclosed cabins. Whilst seats don't recline, the lights can be switched off inside your cabin. While 1st Class Reserved wagons are open, lights can not be turned off though the seats are wide and do recline. It is suggested you bring some ear plugs and also an eye mask for personal comfort. A neck pillow is also good idea, for a little added comfort. Rest rooms (which are very basic in standard) are located at the end of each wagon.

It is possible to upgrade to a sleeper cabin, reservations need to be made PRIOR to departure. Please ask your reservation consultant for more information.

Occasionally, the Nefertiti Class and the 1st Class Reserve train service are cancelled, in which case we would need to revert to a sleeper service at an additional cost to the passenger. You would be advised in Egypt, as although this occurrence is rare, there would be little notice offered.

SLEEPER TRAIN SERVICE, SLEEPER CABIN UPGRADE: On our Jewel of the Nile and Family tours we include the Sleeper Cabin Train as part of your journey. If you book our SLEEPER TRAIN UPGRADE this is also the service that you will be travelling on. Sleeper Train Cabins are equipped with 2 bunk beds with linen provided. Cabins are lockable, A/C and lighting are also controlled from the inside. Each cabin has a washbasin and small towel and western style bathrooms are located at the end of the carriage. Dinner and breakfast (of an average standard) are served throughout the journey.
