visa requirements

Visas are required by all visitors to Russia. If you book an on the go tour directly with us or through your travel agent, we can obtain the letter of invitation for you which is required for Russian visa applications. If a resident of the UK, we'll provide visa forms and can arrange visa procurement. If resident overseas, please contact a specialist visa company. Further information is also available online at onthegotours.com. It is your responsibility to ensure you procure your visa in a

timely fashion. We recommend you apply for your visa at least 1 month before departure. Visa fees are at your own expense.

climate

Continental, with distinct periods of warm and very cold weather. Summer days from mid-May - early Sept are warm and very long. Autumn is brief, and by end Nov, temps plummet and the snow arrives. Spring arrives bringing with it the great thaw in March and April. If visiting in winter, wear extremely warm attire inc. a hat, gloves, long coat, thermals and sensible shoes.

time

Western Russia is 3 hours ahead of GMT.

money

GBP 1=RUB 48 USD 1=RUB 30 AUD 1=RUB 27 EUR 1=RUB 41 (subject to fluctuation). The Rouble is exchangeable only in Russia. Bureau de Change and ATMs exist in Moscow and St Pete's and currency can be withdrawn in either Euros or Roubles in most machines. Changing traveller cheques is cumbersome. Credit cards are not always accepted. Note: All optional tours purchased locally are payable in USD/EURO cash or Russian Roubles.

health requirements

Diphtheria, Polio and Tetanus. If visiting Yekaterinburg and doing outdoor activities between May-August, a vaccination for tick-borne Encephalitis is recommended. Please check with your local health provider.

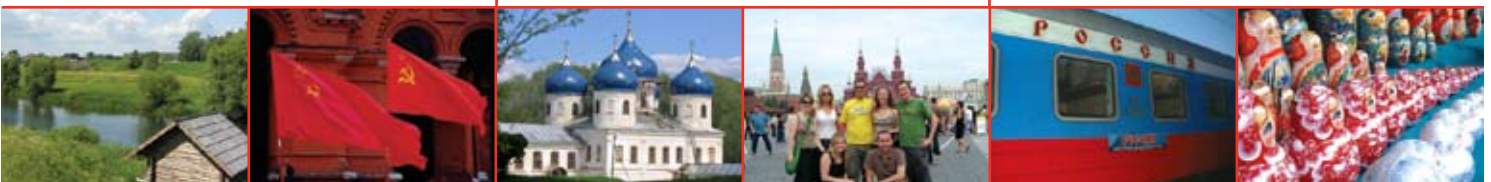
- **ENTRANCE FEES**
Entrance fees are not included in your tour. Please budget approximately USD \$50-70
- **TIPPING**
In better restaurants tip 10% if you are pleased with the food/service. If you would like to express your thanks to your driver, local guide or tour leader, we would suggest approx USD\$25 - 30 per person. Though naturally tipping is an entirely personal gesture.

russia all the way: itinerary

day 1 - moscow

Saturday. Welcome to Russia and the start of your holiday! Arrival transfer from the airport to hotel and check in. Tonight, around 8pm, our tip-filled Welcome Meeting takes place. Rest of evening free. Your trip leader will recommend some local bars and restaurants for you to try out. Overnight - Moscow.

An arrival transfer is included for all those arriving on day 1 or those arriving earlier who have booked pre tour accommodation through on the go. Our transfer representatives wait 90 minutes from the time your flight has landed and they will be holding a visible on the go sign. As the transfer representative will not personally recognise you, it is important you keep an eye out for the on the go sign.

It is also important if you are delayed that you contact our Moscow or St Petersburg office (as detailed on your tour voucher) to advise that you have been delayed for whatever reason. If your luggage has been misplaced, head to 'Information' or your airline's desk prior to exiting Customs to find out how you may lodge a 'lost luggage' report beyond Customs, in 'Arrivals'. That way, you may rendezvous with your transfer representative in a timely fashion.

days 2 & 3 - red square & kremlin

Moscow - breakfast. Moscow lies in the centre of what is known as European Russia. Moscow is a city where ancient Russia meets the Soviet Union and capitalism-boldly illustrated by the golden onion domes of the Kremlin's Orthodox Churches which peer out past Lenin's austere red granite mausoleum and over the massive GUM shopping complex-home to Barbie and Levi jeans. The city is the barometer and epicentre of the changes sweeping through Russia.

The Kremlin, a north-pointing triangle with 750 metre sides, is at Moscow's heart in every way. Red Square lies along its eastern side, the Moskva River flows to the south. From here, Moscow is best described as spreading out in four distinctive rings of development-each area having its own cluster of museums, elegant buildings, shops and monasteries. Most of Moscow's sights are within the first circle-an area that is easily covered on foot. Good news - Moscow lacks steep hills!

On day 2, we'll ride the capital's efficient Metro to Red Square. From here, we'll take in the jewels of

Russia's capital on a guided walk in the Kitay-Gorod and Lubyanka area that takes in sights such as the epitome of Russian power - the Kremlin where we later enjoy a guided tour. In Red Square, feast your eyes on the wildly coloured turban domed St Basil's Cathedral - an enduring Russian symbol. If open, we can see the eerie Lenin Mausoleum where the grandfather of Russian Communism - Vladimir Lenin still lies in state.

On day 3 we tour the mighty Kremlin, where we undertake a guided walk through the grounds and see numerous government buildings, gold-domed cathedrals and the tsar bell. Citadel of the tsars, headquarters of the since defunct Soviet Union and now the residence of the Russian president, for centuries the Kremlin has been symbol of the power of the state. Joseph Stalin orchestrated his special blend of terror from within these walls. Below the glistening gold domes of the Kremlin are a series of breathtaking cathedrals and churches within the Kremlin complex.

The rest of the day is free for you to explore more of Moscow or opt to join us on a tour of a Cold War Soviet bunker. Head 65 meters underground to explore a Stalinist-era bunker that up until recently was a top secret symbol of Soviet Power! To read more about the bolt-on see our website or brochure.

NOTE: Please don't carry gigantic day - packs/ rucksacks for our visit to Red Square (Lenin's Mausoleum - if open) and the Moscow Kremlin today, as you'll need to store them before entry into the Kremlin and Lenin's Mausoleum on Red Square (which is closed during the opening times of the Mausoleum). Overnight (2) - Moscow.

day 4 - explore moscow

Moscow - Pskov - breakfast. Free day. Pulsating neons and billboard hoardings are proof Moscow has embraced capitalism. However, its plentiful museums, Stalinist-era Metro, stately buildings and traditions ensure Moscow holds onto its rich heritage. Tonight, we travel to Pskov. Overnight - sleeper train.

day 5 - pskov

Pskov region - breakfast. Arrival at Pskov and check-in to hotel. With the Estonian border just 30km away, richly historical Pskov has played host to a stream of Baltic invaders for 700 years. A tour of Pskov takes in the riverside fortified kremlin, cathedral and other sights.

A short drive brings us to the beautiful 14th century Pechory Monastery, where we explore the peaceful grounds and if monastic law permits, an exploration of the burial caves of this fascinating and still-working cloister. Steaming up at a local Russian banya (sauna) will work our appetites up for a vodka and lunch. Lunch, dinner & overnight - Pskov.

day 6 - st petersburg

Pskov - St Petersburg - breakfast. This morning, we drive to St Petersburg, arriving early this afternoon. Founded by Peter the Great, grandiose St Petersburg is designed around an intrinsic network of canals and rivers. Known as the cradle of Revolution, in the 20th century the city underwent three revolutions, three revolutions and a 900-day siege. As a result of the important anniversary, the city had benefited greatly. Hundreds of historical buildings and churches have been restored to their former glory, new metro stations have opened, dozens of new shops and boutiques have appeared, and new museums, theatres, bars and restaurants have enlivened the cultural scene.

The rest of the day is free for you to enjoy. Most of the city sights are dotted along and just off the main thoroughfare - Nevsky Prospekt. It's an easy city to find your bearings and get around. Overnight - St Petersburg.

days 7 & 8 - hermitage

St Petersburg - breakfast. This morning (day 7), a city coach tour gives us an overview. We then enjoy a guided visit of the Hermitage Collection at the Winter Palace. Housing some 2.8 million pieces of art, with collections ranging from Egyptian mummies to Greek vases and a vast and dazzling array of Old Masters, we'll view the highlights. The rest of the day is free to do St Pete's your way.

On day 8, enjoy a free day. If you purchase the **pukka pass**, you will enjoy additional guided sightseeing inclusive of transport. Touring will include Peter & Paul Fortress (where the city began), St Isaac's Cathedral (the world's biggest) and dependent upon opening hours and availability either a visit to the gardens of Peter the Great's palatial Peterhof which overlooks the Gulf of Finland (in summer) or a visit to Catherine Palace at Tsarskoe Selo (or Pavlosk Palace on winter tours if Catherine Palace is closed). Professional guided commentary and a Russian lunch.

Peter and Paul Fortress was built on the orders of Peter the Great. At one time a gruesome prison, within the compound is SS Peter and Paul Cathedral - housing the tombs of the Romanov monarchs. St Isaac's Cathedral is the world's largest cathedral and the construction was a colossal engineering feat. Thousands of wood piles were sunk into the city's marshy ground to support its weight of 300,000 tonnes! From the dome are panoramic views that sweep across the city. The lavish imperial palace at Tsarskoe Selo was designed for Tsarina Elizabeth, who named it Catherine Palace in honour of her mum, Catherine I. The Amber Room is a stunning drawcard. Peterhof on the Gulf of Finland is Russia's 'Versailles' and popular in summer with its lavish gold fountains - the centre piece of which is the 'Grand Cascade' are amazing.

Overnight (2) - St Petersburg.

days 9 & 10 - enjoy st petes

St Petersburg - breakfast. We bid goodbye to those on the 9 day 'Russia Unplugged' tour and enjoy 2 free days to relax in vibrant St Pete's.

Overnight (2) - St Petersburg.

day 11 - time to explore

St Petersburg - Novgorod - breakfast. Free day. Last day in St Pete's before we head south to Novgorod. Stock up on stackable wooden dolls at the souvenir market near the striking Church on Spilled Blood, have some delicious St Petersburg ice cream or take a hike along Nevsky. The choice is yours!

Later we travel by coach or train to Novgorod where we enjoy a steamy Russian banya (sauna). Dinner and overnight - Novgorod.

day 12 - novgorod

Novgorod - Moscow - breakfast. Novgorod is one of Russia's oldest cities, located within reach of the Volkhov river and Lake Ilmen. It was formed as a town in the middle of the 10th century. A tour of Novgorod takes in the riverside fortified kremlin, cathedral and other sights. The fortress was mentioned in chronicles as early as in 1044, whilst today's walls and towers, despite being re-built in 15th century, are impressive all the same. Tonight we have dinner before travelling by overnight sleeper train from Novgorod to Moscow. Dinner and overnight - train

day 13 - moscow

Moscow - breakfast. Early this morning, we arrive into Moscow - the capital that spawned dozens of spy novels! Arriving around 1300hrs, we'll check-in. Remains of day free to see any of the sights you missed or just enjoy metropolitan moscow.

Overnight - Moscow.

day 14 - moscow

Friday. Moscow - breakfast. Hotel checkout 12 noon. Last minute shopping and sightseeing, if your flight schedule permits.

NOTE: In Russia on the go use 3 star accommodation as classified by the Russian Ministry of Tourism. However, please be aware that the 3 star standards through-out Russia vary greatly and cannot be compared to hotels of a similar standard in Western Europe or, and in particular, the United States.

Russia is suffering from a severe shortage of quality 3 star hotels. Tourism is relatively new to the land, resulting in demand for hotels far outweighing the supply. With demand being high, hoteliers have unified with massive price increases, yet continue to paint a rose coloured picture as to what constitutes '3 star' hotel. On the go in Russia have taken great lengths to locate the best quality hotels at realistic prices in each of the cities we travel to. All the hotels we provide are clean, comfortable and functional, as well as being within close proximity to public transport, amenities and local sights.

alternative itinerary

Depending on the scheduling of our overnight train between St Petersburg and Vladimir, it may be necessary to alter our touring itinerary.

The revised itinerary will be as follows:

day 11 - St Petersburg to Vladimir
day 12 - Vladimir - day trip to Suzdal, explore the Kremlin, cathedral and wood carving museum and enjoy a banya. Back to Vladimir to explore the Kremlin, cathedrals and the golden gate.
day 13 - Vladimir - Moscow. Arrive Moscow approx midday and continue with standard itinerary.

Note: Meal Changes - Dinner on day 11 is replaced by lunch on day 12
