visa requirements

Visas are required by all visitors to Russia. If you book at on the go tour we can obtain the letter of invitation for you which is required for Russia visas. If you are a resident of the UK, we'll supply all visa forms & can arrange visa procurement. If you are a resident overseas, please contact a specialist visa company to procure visa forms and to arrange visa issue. It is your responsibility to ensure you procure

your visa in a timely fashion and visa fees are at your own expense. We recommend that you apply for your visas at least 6 weeks prior to departure. Further visa info is available online at onthegotours.com.

climate & time

Russia - Continental, with distinct periods of warm & very cold weather. Summer from mid-May - early Sept is warm with long days. Autumn is brief. By end Nov, temps plummet & snow arrives. Spring brings the great thaw in Mar & Apr. Winter visits - wear very warm attire inc. a hat, gloves, long coat & sensible shoes.

money

GBP 1 = RUB 48 USD 1 = RUB 30 EUR1 = RUB 41 (subject to fluctuation). The Rouble is exchangeable only in Russia. Bureau de Change and ATMs exist in Moscow and St Pete's and currency can be withdrawn in either Euros or Roubles in most machines. Changing traveller cheques is cumbersome. Credit cards are not always accepted.

molotov cocktail: itinerary

day 1 - any day of your choice

Welcome to St Petersburg! Arrival transfer from St Petersburg Pulkovo airport to our hotel. Buzzing with cafés, bars and restaurants, St Pete's is renowned for its fine Baltika beer and unashamedly good vodka. Perhaps get your trip off to a celebratory start! Overnight - St Petersburg.

day 2 - st petersburg

St Petersburg - breakfast. Welcome to flamboyant St Petersburg - city of tsars! Bereft of the Soviet breeze block style architecture that characterises so many of Russia's cities, the city is jam-packed with grandiose palaces and stately buildings.

Founded by Peter the Great in 1703, St Petersburg is designed around an intrinsic network of canals and rivers built in lavish and grandiose style. As with all pioneering founding fathers and wanna-be town-planners, Peter had his work cut out. He probably chose the most desolate and windswept piece of swamp in all of the Imperial Russian Empire and should have known it was a bad idea to found a city here. The first flood, just three months after he started building the Peter and Paul Fortress in 1703, swept away all his building materials. He pushed on relentlessly, though. The water rises dangerously high on average once a year, though four floods, in 1777, 1824, 1924 and 1955, wrought mighty damage. Indeed, in 1824 the whole city was submerged and 462 buildings were destroyed. Fortunately, in 1989 construction of a dam was begun to prevent a future catastrophic flood.

Known as the cradle of Revolution, in the 20th century St Petersburg underwent three name changes, three revolutions and a whopping 900-day siege. Despite a rocky start or 'wet' start, the city celebrated its 300th anniversary in 2003. As a result, the city benefited greatly. 100s of historical buildings and churches have been restored to their former glory, new metro stations and dozens of new shops and boutiques have opened to complement the city's array of museums, theatres, bars and restaurants. The world-famous Hermitage art collection at the Winter Palace remains St Pete's top cultural attraction.

A guided coach tour gives us a solid orientation of St Petersburg and its key areas. Travelling by vehicle is a really effective way of getting one's bearings in St Petersburg. View highlights such as St Isaac's Cathedral, The Winter Palace, Church on Spilled Blood, Russian Museum, the battleship Aurora, Peter and Paul Fortress and of course the mighty River

Neva on our drive. You're welcome to later visit and independently tour these attractions. Remains of the day free to explore more of the city or just chill-out. Overnight - St Petersburg

day 3 - train to moscow

St Petersburg - Moscow - breakfast. Free day to explore the city and surrounds. Tonight - an included transfer to the rail station for overnight train to Moscow. Overnight - train.

- **Hermitage Museum (Winter Palace)** - begs a visit from art buffs and culture vultures. The Hermitage Collections comprise a staggering array of paintings, drawings, silver and porcelain amassed by Catherine the Great. After the Revolution, the nationalisation of both royal and private property enabled more paintings and works of applied art to be collected, making the Hermitage one of the world's leading museums. Today, the Hermitage offers one of the world's greatest collections of art - totalling some 2.9 million exhibits. You'll only scratch the surface!
- **Residences of the tsars** - A visit to one of the palaces will bring to life the history of the tsar ruling class and the luxurious lifestyle they led.
- **Petrodvorets** - known also as Peterhof. Russia's answer to Versailles. Famous for its magnificent gold fountains, a visit to the palace is a treat in summer.
- **Pushkin** - known also as Tsarskoe Selo, the awesome peacock blue and gilt facade of Catherine Palace is simply stunning.
- **Peter and Paul Fortress** - The Peter and Paul Fortress on Petrogradskaya Side is the city's historic nucleus and most major of landmarks. The fortress was laid down on 16 May 1703 on Zayachiy Island to secure Russia's hold on the Neva Delta. It was called St Petersburg (named after the cathedral built on its territory). Later the name was given to the city that started to grow rapidly around the fortress grounds. The fortress was first built in wood and was later replaced, section by section, in stone. It's history is a gruesome one, since hundreds of forced labourers perished while constructing the fortress and it's bastions were later used to guard and torture many political prisoners. Peter the Great's own son-Alexei was one of the first in a long line of prominent

political prisoners to be held there. Today, the fortress is preserved as an historical monument.

Today, the fortress is preserved as an historical monument. On the fortress grounds are a number of museums and the magnificent 122.5 metre spired SS.Peter and Paul Cathedral. The cathedral with its marbled columns, amazing chandeliers an incredible carved and gilded iconostasis creates a reverent setting for the tombs of the Romanov monarchs. Most recently-in 1998, the remains of the last Russian tsar Nicholas II and his family were interred in the Ekaterininskiy Wing of the cathedral bringing a fitting close to this chapter in history.

The Artillery Museum also forms parts of the fortress and is a must for military buffs! The museum boasts more than 600 pieces of artillery and military vehicles, including tanks. There are uniforms; weaponry and several rooms dedicated to World War II. The star of the show has to be the armoured car in which the Lenin rode in triumph from Finland Station to Kshesinskaya Mansion on 3 April 1917.

Church on Spilled Blood - just off Nevsky Propekt and a must - see. The exterior of the church rather resembles famous St Basil's Cathedral on Red Square - due to its whimsical, almost Disneyesque onion - bulbed turrets. The church was built on the site of Alexander II's murder on 01 March 1881. In 1883 his successor Alexander III, launched a sort of competition for a lasting memorial. The winning design, which took almost 25 years to complete, is what we see today. Impossibly colourful mosaics and elaborate stone carving are the main features of the church exterior, whilst inside more than 20 types of minerals are lavished on the mosaics of the iconostasis, icon cases, canopy and floor. The interior reopened in 1998 after more than 20 years of restoration.

day 4 - moscow

Moscow - Arrive Moscow and start your Trans-Siberian trip.
